

LAMENT; Or, The mine has been opened up well is an outtake of SMOKEPENNY LYRICHORD HEAVENBRED, a mixed-reality performance and installation work that excavates sites, histories, and languages of mining in a poetics of generative telegraphy, geophysical extraction, and the multilingual hauntings of forgotten laborers. LAMENT proposes a critical archaeology of contemporary network culture in response to the extraordinary material, political, and environmental legacies that make cloud computing possible. Hoisting virtual landscapes and augmented-reality textscapes datamined from boom, strike, and bust in the Upper Midwest's Copper Country and the Copper Belt of the American West, the piece explores the extraction, processing, and harnessing of copper as a conductor for sprawling networks of exploitation and control as well as illumination.

The libretto capitalizes on language from Moreing & Neal's New General & Mining Telegraph Code (1905 New York edition), and draws from global archives documenting the history of copper mining as a basis of modern telecommunications. Telegrams housed in Michigan Tech's Copper Country Historical Collections clarify the various ways in which the telegraph—whose copper cables provided the eventual foundation for the internet—was used to bridle the laborers who constituted the corporal infrastructure of that technology. Baroque code compounds store the brute links between bodies, metal, and the market, sometimes sanitizing, at other times proving grossly expressive. The riotous core of these texts is the great strike of 1913 at the Calumet & Hecla Mining Company in Michigan's Keweenaw Peninsula, a bloody conflict provoked by the introduction of a hazardous economizing tool into the mines: the one-man compressed air drill.

Visitors are invited to explore this datascape by way of the iPad: swiveling and shaking the device will advance select movements of the libretto.
